- Dr. Stoll and Dr. Kimberly Robertello submitted abstract, *Ethical Responsibilities of Coaches in Emergency Care Situations: Preparing Others in your Absence*" for the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) 2013 meeting. Dr. Robertello is with Indiana Wesleyan University and Dr. Stoll's 16th finished doctoral student, class of 2008.
- The Center received a request for information on moral reasoning inventories by a Ph.D. student at Liberty University. The Center houses the largest depository of information on moral reasoning for competitive populations in the world today.
- Dr. Stoll and Dr. Angela Lumpkin, University of Kansas, had a manuscript, "Responsible Conduct: The Ethics of It All in Life and Research" pass the "thematic compatibility" review for the *Journal of Values Based Leadership*. The article is tentatively scheduled for a November publication. The *Journal of Values Based Leadership* promotes ethical and moral leadership and behavior by serving as a forum for ideas and the sharing of "best practices:.Dr. Lumpkin is a former Dean of the School of Education at Kansas and one of the three authors with Stoll of *Practical Ethics In Sport Management*, published in 2012 by MacFarland Press.
- Dr. Stoll and Dr. Jennifer Beller submitted two abstracts for the 2013 American Alliance of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance in Charlotte, S. C.
- The Center for ETHICS* and The World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) are working on a collaborative education project, Competing with Honor: To Dope or Not to Dope. One of the projects goals is to educate high-level athletes on the value competing drug free. Upon successful completion of the initial project the course will become part of WADA's educational curriculum.
