The Center for ETHICS* at the University of Idaho offers study, intervention, outreach, consultation, and leadership in developing and advancing the theory, knowledge and understanding of character education including moral and ethical reasoning, moral development, ethical leadership, and ethical application. The Director of the Center for ETHICS* is Dr. Sharon Kay Stoll.

The Center for Ethics is a contract awardee in a grant that has been accepted by the National Centers for Academic Excellence in Cybersecurity. The \$30,000 contract award to the Center is to support the pedagogical work of the 1 million dollar project directed by Barbara Endicott Popvosky, Ph.D. Executive Director, Center for Information Assurance and Cybersecurity, University of Washington. The purpose of this project is to create an online, interdisciplinary, graduate, veteran/military friendly, cyber response program that can serve both transitioning veterans and future military and civilian leaders. The course content will incorporate relevant interdisciplinary topics provided by a group of SME's from law, ethics and pedagogy who will comprise an Executive Steering Committee (ESC) that will meet regularly to review content and insert topics that will integrate several subjects into the course. Dr. Stoll presently is in midst of filming the last eight lessons for this contract.

Dr. Stoll finished a review for Medical Education Online, A Taylor and Francis Publication.

Dr. Stoll's 37th doctoral student, Marcis Fennell, has accepted a job offer to become Head Football Coach at West Seattle (WA) High School. As he enters the dissertation phase of the Ph.D. program, Marcis has accepted the position with the intention of implementing the curriculum associated with the Center for ETHICS* within the program. In addition to the use of the current curriculum, Marcis will develop and implement a *Coaches of Character* curriculum for the program that will contribute the Center's curriculum.

Upcoming Events

Dr. Stoll's 38th doctoral student, Aubrey Shaw, will be presenting a paper at the University of Idaho's Women's Leadership Conference on March 30, 2017. The paper is titled, *Serving all women: Including women with impairments*.

Dr. Stoll will be traveling to Whittier College, California, to be a keynote speaker in their exploring organizational leadership as a liberal art, particularly in relation to our Kinesiology and Nutritional Sciences Department April 20 and 21, 2017. Whittier won a grant to engage in questions about ethics, leadership, moral education/decision making in the context of KNS (or any leadership setting), and the like. Right now, we are engaged in matching professors from the Humanities (literature, anthropology, and film) with professors and students in KNS to expand the way we think about sport sciences.
