


THIS WEEK AT THE CENTER FOR ETHICS*

- Montana State is the newest DI-AA school to join the family of WWC. Dr. Stoll and Beller will be driving to Bozeman in the next few weeks to do a workshop with WWC (Winning with Character) with their coaches.
- Matt Schantz, a doctoral student at Central Michigan University, has spent a week here at the Center working as an intern. Mr. Schantz wishes to study in spirituality and its effect on moral reasoning. The Ed.D. degree in Educational Leadership at Central Michigan is designed to provide in-depth knowledge and skills to practicing educational leaders who seek to develop and refine their knowledge and skills to help transform through practice the K-12 educational institution.
- Two seniors in Exercise Science are beginning a summer internship with the Center.  - Training with WWC is scheduled for June 23 in Athens, GA, presently we have approximately 15 new schools scheduled, plus approximately 30 returning schools..

Georgia Military College is a public-independent educational institution, comprised of a junior college and a separate preparatory school (grades 6-12), whose mission and purpose is to produce educated citizens by providing junior college students with a liberal arts based two-year undergraduate curriculum, by providing selected college students with ROTC training, and by providing preparatory school students an inclusive college preparatory curriculum that includes a military training component--all in an environment conducive to the holistic development of the intellect and character of its students.
