





Tracking patterns across contemporary horror (1980-the present).


What constitutes "horror"?



Haunted Houses


31 produced between 2008 and 2016, representing 21% of U.S. horror in this period. 141% increase from previous 8 years

of Films




Possessions & Exorcisms

16 produced between 2008 and 2016, representing 11% of U.S. horror in this period 357% increase from previous 8 years




Creepy Kiddos

22 produced between 2008 and 2016, representing 15% of U.S. horror in this period 371% increase from previous 8 years




Home Invasion

9 produced between 2008 and 2016, representing 6% of U.S. horror in this period. 285% increase from previous 8 years




Technological Horrors



There are clear connections between haunted houses, home invasions, and the housing market crash, but what are the larger cultural contexts unifying these cycles?

WHITENESS

Haunted Houses and Whiteness



Not just "housing" that is in crisis, but the ability of the white middle class to use home ownership to maintain economic and cultural privileges.

In horror storytelling: economically insecure white families poised to lose historical privileges.

Other Cycles & Whiteness

Possession/Exorcism: White men besieged by the culture who turn to rigid traditions to maintain authority over women and children.

Creepy Kiddos: White women with broken families who are tormented by demonic and/or sociopathic children that they cannot control.

Other Cycles & Whiteness

Technological Horrors: White families who think that surveillance culture will save them from nefarious threats; instead, it only reveals horrors.

Domestic Remakes: White-centric horror films which insist that the present is far worse than the past.

Whiteness & Horror History

Across history, horror has also addressed historical traumas through the lens of whiteness...

- The Great Depression & Racial Violence
- The Atomic Bomb & Foreign Contamination
- Vietnam and the White Family
- Gorno and international entanglements
